Ian Kuijt is Professor of Anthropology at the University of Notre Dame. His research interests include archaeology, Irish historical archaeology, social inequality and food production in the Near Eastern Neolithic period, mortuary analysis, and lithic technology. He is the co-author of *Island Places, Island Lives: Exploring Inishbofin and Inishark Heritage, Co. Galway, Ireland* (with Ryan Lash, William Dunaruma, Katie Shakour, and Tommy Burke; forthcoming); *People of the Middle Fraser Canyon: An Archaeological History* (with A. Prentiss; 2012); and editor or co-editor of *Transformation by Fire: The Archaeology of Cremation in Cultural Context* (with C. Quinn and G. Cooney; forthcoming); and *Macroevolution in Human Prehistory* (with A. Prentiss and J. C. Chatters; 2009). In 2005, Professor Kuijt was awarded a research

fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities and, from 2009 to 2011 he was a John Templeton Foundation Research Fellow in Çatal Höyük, Turkey.

Rahul Oka is the Ford Family Assistant Professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Notre Dame. An economic anthropologist, professor Oka's research interests include anthropology of urbanism, social network analysis, the development of complex socio-economic systems, and applications of agent-based simulation modeling techniques to anthropology and archaeometry. He focuses on the relationship between trade, urbanism and political infrastructures. His fieldwork has included archaeological excavations in India and Kenya, archaeometric research on trade in the Indian Ocean, and ethnohistoric and ethnographic research on trading communities in Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin America. He is the co-editor of *Ecology, Economy and Culture*:

Human Adaptation in Tsavo, Southeastern Kenya (with Chapurukha M. Kusimba and Sibel Kusimba; forthcoming) and author and co-author of numerous articles in journals that include Economic Anthropology, American Anthropologist, the Journal of Archaeological Research, and the Journal of Archaeological Method and Theory. In 2010, he was appointed Fellow of the Society for Applied Anthropology.
